Brazilian context

Pop: 214,3 milhões 5,568 municipalities 15 metro areas



- 2030: 90% of population in cities
- 40% in metropolitan areas
- 7th largest country GHG emitter
- 2030: emissions to increase by 60%
- Private vehicle fleet increased 280% in last two decades
- 20% of workers in the metropolitan regions spend more than 1 hour commuting daily
- Bicycles are underutilized in the main cities of the country: <2.4%
- Demand for public transport is still below the last pre-pandemic year: decreased by 25% in São Paulo, and 30% in Rio de Janeiro

Despite a remarkable mobility policy, priority is still given to private cars

Leading to inefficient, unequal and unsustainable mobility

Rio has less than 3% of its roads with some priority for public transport

49% of trips in Curitiba are made by car or motorcycle





Brazilian cities are ...

Produced to be spatially segregated

Organized to be seen from inside a vehicle at 60km/h

Committed to protect private property





Unequal distribution of space kills

Brasil: 2nd highest number of deaths per capita in LATAM (23.4/100,000 inhabitants)

71% of deaths are of black people

Unequal distribution of space ignores the reproductive work and practices of care

São Paulo

13% daily trips by automobiles (vs. 27% men) 74% daily trips by public transport or walking (vs. 62% men)

16% +daily trips by active modes than men

Women trips by cars per income: lower income bracket (3%) vs. Higher (45%)

Recife

More than half of the population is made up of women, 60% of which are black.

65% of women depend on public transport or walking to reach school or work.

Inclusive cities need less vehicles

- Urban planning practices >> secure **productive work.**
- Reproductive work, care practices, and infrastructure for everyday life are not a priority.
- "Gender issues" have been adopted in discourses in the transport sector with sensitive and responsive measures, but little transformative action.
- Need for an **intersectional perspective**: that fosters new questions and areas of inquiry and provides new directions for rethinking areas of a traditional discipline.
- **Elderly**: number of elderly grew 18% in 5 years and exceeded 30 million in 2017.
